Looking Over the Pulpit—Duayne Meyer

“A million-and-one questions with just one answer: ‘I don’t know.’”

I am sure I have used the phrase “*I don’t know*” more often these past twelve months than the previous ten years combined. Along with it, the expressions, “Wait and see,” “We are hoping for the best but preparing for the worst,” “We didn’t expect this,” “We’re drinking from the fire hose,” and “We’re doing the best we can, given what we know right now.” So many clichés, so little time! There are still more expressions, a few of which are not appropriate for polite conversation, much less a pastoral epistle.

Having said this, in the midst of crisis, confusion and chaos we have learned a great deal and we have learned how to do a fair number of new things in a relatively short period of time. The word “pivot” has been bandied about as the way to describe the necessary response to the pandemic. I wince when I hear the word in much the same way as when I hear the word Zoom. We have – as many have – adapted and have proved that among the gifts faith and community give us is resilience grounded in memory, hope and God given intellect.

I still find myself using the expression “*I don’t know*.” When will there be in-person Sunday School? When will the children and youth be able to attend church? When will the choirs reassemble? When can congregational singing resume? When can we sit down to have a meal? When will there be a Fellowship Hour following worship? When can we all be back in church at the same time? You guessed it: “*I don’t know*,” not really. But I am hoping, praying and planning for those things to be possible in the next few months and in-time for the fall program year.

Early during the pandemic, NCC’s staff, Trustees and Council, despite not being fully in the know, did what we could to improve air quality inside the building and to ensure those coming and going have the tools needed to be safe and healthy. Within weeks of the quarantine we were livestreaming and videoconferencing, things about which we had previously known little. One thing I know is, while these ways of getting together are helpful, they are not the most satisfying, at least not to this preacher. I know I am looking forward to being together unmasked, unheeded and up close and personal.

And I know it will be a glad day when the answer is no longer, “*I don’t know*,” or “Not yet,” and instead will be, “Praise the Lord we are back together!” Until then, we will remain resolute, resilient, creative and resourceful as the Holy Spirit has given us the means to be.



NCC Day in the Life

*Stories from NCC Parishioners: Judy Hertelendy

I moved to Northbrook with my parents, Grace and Fred Ward, in the summer of 1961 as I started college. At first, we attended Winnetka Presbyterian Church, where Lloyd Ogilvie was the minister. But we were never quite ready to join. We first came to Northfield Community Church on Good Friday in 1962. Each year, several area churches combined for a three-hour worship service from noon to 3pm, with different ministers sharing thoughts on the seven last words of Christ. Parishioners came and went as they were able. We arrived to hear Rev. Ogilvie, then stayed as NCC's Rev. Webb Howard spoke. Something resonated within us, and we began attending NCC regularly, joining later that year. I have been active at NCC ever since.

At that point, the Sanctuary had only been in existence for about a year. The classroom wing and current Youth Room were not yet constructed. I joined the choir and taught at Vacation Bible School each summer, when about 100 children participated. My first classroom was in the Nursery - what is now the storeroom (have you ever noticed the Winnie-the-Pooh paintings on the wall behind the chairs?). Eventually I became active in the Women's Guild, which met monthly for luncheon and a speaker. They also held annual bazaars, where many of the items sold were handmade at workshops held throughout the year, including the quilt hanging in the hallway outside the coatroom.
