Celebrating 175 years

With the lifting of some Cook County restrictions the sanctuary can easily accommodate 25 or more people in worship. The chapel is another story and can accommodate about 10 persons in addition to our worship leaders. If you decide to attend in person, please observe physical distancing guidelines and wear a mask. Of course we will continue to livestream via the church website and Facebook Live. We are awaiting the news of when we will be granted Roku and Apple TV channels. As you can imagine, there is a backlog and it may be a few more weeks or even months before we have these channels.

Eleven consecutive days of snow fall has me thinking (a lot!) about gardening, both my in garden here at the parsonage as well as NCC's Community and Butterfly Gardens. I have marked my calendar to remind me when I can plant my seeds indoors, though there is currently eight feet of snow on top of my raised beds. I can't shake the idea that I'll be shoveling snow out of my garden beds on Memorial Day. We shall see.

Among the variety of things discussed at the last Trustees meeting was the creation of a dedicated fund to receive donations for sanctuary improvements and repairs. This is among the first steps being taken toward refreshing the 60 year old worship space. The list of improvements includes sealing the asbestos floor tiles and installing new flooring in the nave and loft, repairing sanctuary heating units, expanding the width of the chancel to make it handicapped accessible, replacing the pews, cleaning/repairing discolored and damaged walls, replacing/upgrading chancel furnishings and upgrading the sanctuary audio-visual system to include video capabilities. Also being considered is whether it is feasible to install a lift or elevator to accommodate the choir room and organ loft. Stay tuned for more information. (continued on next page)

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175/75 Anniversary Celebration - Gary Eberlein

175/75 Anniversary Celebration – securing Clergy over 175 years

It is the year of our Lord eighteen-hundred fifty-three and we have arrived in what is known as the state of Illinois, Northfield Township in the county of Cook not too far from a rapidly growing town called Chicago. Our sir name is Eberlein and we have arrived from Germany to establish a homestead on some fine crop land with a good stand of timber and a source of good water with the promise of a better life for our family and our future generations. Several families have welcomed us speaking our native language, German, and having established themselves on surrounding farms, proved to be of great assistance as we begin the familiar but arduous task of making a living off the land.

Almost immediately we were asked to join them with other local mostly farm families to gather at a small church, some distance from our property. They were excited to say the small congregation had welcomed just a year ago the first resident pastor and his family since their small church building was erected in 1845. It seems that for seven years they had been served by a number of circuit ministers.

Who was this first resident pastor to serve this early independent band of Reformed and United Lutheran families calling themselves the *German Evangelical Church of Northfield*. In the sparce records of that first church it is noted that his name was the Reverend Ernest Serfling. An Ancestry* search revealed he had studied for the ministry in Nürnberg, Bayern, Germany and served as minister in the Dienstädt, and Kleinbucha, parish, in Eichenberg, Germany. His first wife (1833) died shortly after the birth of their first child, a daughter. He remarried in 1835 and raised eight more children. The family of ten, leaving his first daughter behind, departed from Hamburg aboard the "Irma" in steerage arriving in New York on August 6, 1852. The research goes on to say "they first settled in Cook County, Illinois, where Ernst was for a time a minister at the United Evangelical Reformed Church of Northfield (formerly the German Evangelical Calvinistic Reformed United Lutheran Church). It was while they were in this

area that their oldest daughter Minna died from cholera. They later moved to Fillmore County, Minnesota, where their children homesteaded." We can only use our imagination for what they must have thought when it came to their arriving at that small one room church building on the prairie of Illinois. The record provides no information for housing a family of ten, but one source suggests that he served the congregation for two years.



Supplying the early pioneer churches with ministers was not an easy task. A bit of further research notes that as German immigrants began to flood into the region, the need for German-speaking pastors became critical. By 1837, pastors from missionary societies in Switzerland and Germany began arriving in St. Louis to minister to German frontier communities. In 1840, six clergymen organized the *Deutsche Evangelische Kirchenverein des Westens* (German Evangelical Church Society of the West). Beginning as a local pastors' association, the organization eventually consolidated with other similar Midwestern groups to form the German *Evangelical Synod of North America*. The (ESNA) was an important denomination in the life of the German immigrant community. Of the UCC's four denominational predecessors, the ESNA had the most congregations in the St. Louis, Missouri Valley and southern Illinois regions. These ministers spread northward into Iowa, northern Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota first as circuit clergy and later as settled pastors.

Our 1845 church was organized as an independent, self-supported congregation and remained so until 1913 when it joined the Evangelical and Reformed Church and then became the United Church of Christ in 1957. Six ministers served the church between 1845 and 1863. The "new" 1863 church on Shermer Road and the modern building on Willow Road following the 1961 fire were served by a total of eighteen resident pastors (not counting interims like Rev. Clint Collins) before merging here at NCC.

NCC Day in the Life—Charlie Shabica

Summer 1940 The Northfield Community Church began as a Sunday school held in parishioners' homes, organized by Elsa Stoffers and Dorothy Boyington (who was living with her parents at 735 Happ Road). Dorothy had taught Sunday School at the Wilmette Congregational Church for about 15 years, so had plenty of experience. And on January 9, 1941, the Northfield Village Board met and the Sunday School was granted permission to meet in the village hall every Sunday morning. The Catholics, Episcopals and Lutherans were meeting at Sunset Ridge School that was built in 1929. Sunday school enrollment ranged from 15 to 35 kids who were drawn to the exuberance of teachers who helped then make Valentines, corsages for their moms and Thanksgiving and Christmas projects for the childrens' ward at the county hospital and a small hospital for black folks in Greenwood, South Carolina.

ANNOUNCEMENTS March 6, 1941 Sunday School Activities: The primary department of the Northfield Sunday school has begun a new project on shepherd life and will soon visit the sheep pens at Techny and observe the animals there. Another phase of the project will be to spin yarn on an antique spinning wheel, and knit it into a useful article. Many interesting articles on wool are being collected for a scrap book of the project.
